Dear Kaiser Families,

Here we are, the week before Thanksgiving break. It's time for some reflection on gratitude, thinking about our accomplishments and taking joy in what makes Kaiser a wonderful learning community. I know some of the teachers are leading their students through the process of discussing and writing about gratitude and the things they are grateful for. You can take this time as an opportunity to guide your own children in developing their sense of thankfulness.

- Help your child write a list of people and things for which they are thankful. They can share this list with friends and relatives on Thanksgiving Day.
- If your family does practice a religion, guide your child in writing a Thanksgiving Day prayer or blessing before the meal.
- Model gratefulness and appreciation for your children and tell them what you're doing and why you're doing it. They will learn from your example.
- Encourage your child to write an appreciation note, which is like a thank you note except that it's not for a specific thing. It's simply a note telling someone how much you appreciate them for what they do and how much they are part of your life. Imagine the delight and surprise upon receiving one of those!
- Tell your child that you are grateful for them and name a very specific reason. Giving the reason makes your sentiment much more believable, and contributes to its uplifting effect.

So now that I've given all this advice about how to develop gratitude in our children, I'd better set an example, especially with the last item. Here is a short list of why I am thankful:

I am grateful for you, our parents and guardians, who prepare your children so well and support the teachers in their efforts. We know how complex and difficult it can be to raise your children—feed, clothe, shelter, guide, nurture, respond, enjoy, read to, monitor hygiene, intervene when needed, work hard at your careers to pay for everything, getting the kids here on time, advocate for, nurse, medicate, enjoy, pray with, celebrate, teach respect and courtesy, help with projects, tell to listen to the teachers, volunteer with PTA, SSC, and in the classrooms, relearn math while helping with homework, discipline and train, pass on values, drive all over town, plan birthday parties, give music lessons and nag for practice, surprise with gifts at the holidays—and all the countless things you do to bring us these joyful beings with whom we work every day. We humbly thank you!

I appreciate our clerical support staff who are the wonderful "worker bees" who keep the processes of our school flowing. Miss Pearl makes all the copies and manages supplies for our teachers, keeps an eye on the Kindergartners at lunch and recess, and lends her constant smile and cheerful laugh to our school atmosphere. Mira Santos, our community liaison and intervention specialist acts as a catalyst to bring support to parents, smooths the connections between the school and the parent community, and manages the intervention program for our students to help them progress into proficiency and beyond! Miss Susanne runs Adventure Time and also works as intervention support for our school. Robin Sasada does everything: she runs the office, manages records and paperwork, keeps me on track, manages our budget, orders materials and supplies, pleasantly welcomes everyone to our school, sorts the flow of *all* questions and information for all of us, bandages kids when they get hurt, knows everybody's schedule and where all the kids are, and remains a charming delightful presence in the face of enormous stress and responsibility.
